Dear CBA South-East members,

Summer is officially here and fieldwork season is well underway. CBA South-East members are strongly represented in exciting excavations which are currently taking place right across our region. We will continue to bring our members news of these and many other opportunities available now and in the near future.





The new CBA South-East Tours Schedule is continuing to be a popular venture. Last month saw the fascinating twin excursion of the excavation at medieval Downley and the historic town of Arundel. The tours linked together the medieval park at Downley, which was owned by the earls of Arundel, with their main seat of residence, and we were treated to an insight into the natural and historic landscape at Downley by Mark Roberts from University College London, who is the director of the current excavations. Mark expertly revealed to us the intriguing building complex which they have unearthed alongside evidence for apparent feasting deposits, with bones of pigs and deer and oyster shells littering the surrounding areas. After lunch we visited Arundel itself and were treated to a full and insightful history of the town by local historian John Godfrey, taking in the riverside, the site of an important medieval port, the buildings of the backstreets, and the beautiful 14th century church of St Nicholas which uniquely has both catholic and protestant sections. The next tour will visit the Sussex School of Archaeology excavations of the Roman villa at Plumpton and the nearby community excavation of the Roman roadside settlement at Bridge Farm. If you are interested in the Romans then this tour is a must. Remember, it is free to all CBA South-East members and will take place on Saturday July 25th. Please contact our Events Officer (events@cbasouth-east.org) for further details or to book your place.

This year's Annual Archaeology Conference and Annual General Meeting is already booking up fast for the 14th November. Due to our collaboration with the Prehistoric Society and the benefit of their extra advertising streams, places are selling quickly and I urge CBA South-East members to book soon to avoid disappointment (CBASE members can, of course, take advantage of the 20% discount on offer). The Mesolithic theme of the conference is proving to be a popular one, and the Surrey County Archaeology Unit will be offering a handling session of Mesolithic material from the recently published excavation at Bletchingly in Surrey to compliment talks by local archaeologists on new insights from across the region, alongside some current fascinating academic projects. 

Excavations at Ovingdean Medieval Site and Tour of Medieval Lewes town and castle, East Sussex

Led by John Funnell (Brighton and Hove Archaeological Society) and Simon Stevens (Archaeology South-East), this tour takes in the substantial excavations at Ovingdean by Brighton and Hove Archaeological Society, which is producing exciting results of this 13thC earthwork complex and signs of earlier Neolithic, Iron Age, and Roman activity. The morning also includes a walk and talk around the stunning landscape. After lunch, we make the short trip up to Lewes for a tour of this picturesque medieval town and its castle.



Bignor Roman Villa

by David Rudling and Miles Russell

Discovered in 1811, Bignor is one of the most impressive villas in Britain, its mosaics ranking among the finest in north-western Europe. This book sets out to explain the villa, who built it, when, how it would have been used and what it meant within the context of the Roman province of Britannia. It also sets out to interpret the remains, as they appear today, explaining in detail the meaning of the fine mosaic pavements and describing how the villa was first found and explored and the conservation problems facing the site in the twenty-first century. Now, after 200 years, the remarkable story of Bignor Roman Villa is told in full in this beautifully illustrated book. The book also considers Bignor villa within its local rural context and thus includes discussions of other Sussex villas and farmstead sites.
