Dear CBA South-East members,

Welcome to the second of our new series of E-letters from CBA South-East. This issue highlights the wide range of archaeological events, talks, courses, excavations, and publications which may be of interest to you. Last month saw the first of our new **CBA South-East Tours Schedule** where we visited the excavations of the impressive Roman villa in Teston and the exquisite castle in nearby Tonbridge. Simon Elliot led a fascinating tour of Teston villa, providing us with the wider context of the site and his thesis of the early Kent villas being investments of wealth resulting from the industrial quarrying of Kentish ragstone, from which much of Roman London was built. By the time we got to Tonbridge Castle the sun was shining and we basked on the lawn of the magnificent medieval monument as Pat Mortlock unveiled its long and complicated history with ease and enthusiasm. The next tour will be on **Saturday 30th May** where we will visit Downley and the nearby market town of Arundel – remember, these tours are free for all CBA South-East members, so please make the most of the benefits on offer to you!

The recent developments in West Sussex County Council continue to be a major concern for us. The Council has now ceased providing specialist archaeological advice to six of its District Council planning departments. We are actively working with other groups to press for answers from the District Councils as to how they propose to put measures in place which will ensure the full and proper mitigation of the archaeological resource in West Sussex. We will continue to monitor the situation in the immediate future to assess how this resource is dealt with and impacted upon by the activities of developers.

Finally, our **Annual Archaeology** Conference, coinciding with the Annual **General Meeting**, is now open for booking. This year is the turn of Surrey to host the event on Saturday 14th **November**, and we have the pleasure of collaborating with Surrey County Archaeology Unit (SCAU) and Surrey History Centre. This year's theme is on the Mesolithic period and the transition to the Neolithic and we have a fantastic lineup of commercial, community and academic archaeologists, spearheaded by our Keynote speaker, Professor Martin Bell, ready to deliver some of the fascinating new discoveries being made from the region and beyond. In addition, SCAU will be offering a handling session of Mesolithic material for all delegates, with experts on hand to discuss local sites and discoveries. On top of this, the Prehistoric Society has also sponsored the conference, allowing us to offer student bursaries and providing us with more advertising coverage.



Ultimately, the conference is likely to be very well attended and since spaces are limited I urge you to make your booking for this event as soon as possible (not to mention taking advantage of the 20% discount available to all CBA South-East members). It promises to be one of the most fascinating events on offer this year, so make sure you don't miss out! 




Eastbourne: Aspects of Archaeology, History and Heritage edited by Michael J. Allen



This collection of archaeological essays provides an easy insight into the wealth and diversity of archaeology and heritage in the Eastbourne area. Many of the projects described have been undertaken with interested local volunteers, often channelled through the auspices of the Eastbourne Natural History and Archaeological Society (ENHAS). Included is evidence from the Neolithic to the Romans on the Beachy Head Downs, to Bronze Age burial mound at Crowlink, and snippets of postmedieval archaeology in Old Town and mills of the area. Evidence is outlined of the changing and diverse landscape and of prehistoric farming, fields and settlement in Old Town.

Outside the Town: Roman industry, burial and religion at Augustine House, Rhodaus Town, Canterbury by Richard Helm

158p, fully colour illus (Canterbury Archaeological Trust 2014) Pb £20.00 Outside the Town describes discoveries made between 2006 and 2009 during excavations immediately south-east of Canterbury's Roman town wall. The investigations revealed a late Roman shrine along with finds indicative of ritual offerings and associated feasting. Apparently in use over a twenty year period from c AD 340, the shrine was positioned over a late Iron Age inhumation burial which may have originally been marked by a mound, and is one amongst a group of such late Iron Age and early Roman funerary monuments which exist in the vicinity.






Towns in the Dark: Urban Transformations from Late Roman Britain to Anglo-Saxon England by Gavin Speed

205p, b/w illus (Archaeopress Archaeology 2014) Pb £34.00
The aim of this book is to draw together still scattered data to chart and interpret the changing nature of life in towns from the late Roman period through to the mid-Anglo-Saxon period. The research centres on towns that have received sufficient archaeological intervention so that meaningful patterns can be traced. The case studies are arranged into three regional areas: the South-East, South-West, and Midlands. Towns in the Dark dispels the simplistic myth of outright urban decline and failure after Rome, and demonstrates that life in towns often did continue with variable degrees of continuity and discontinuity.

Bryan Faussett: Antiquary Extraordinary by David Wright

Archaeopress Archaeological Lives 2015 – EPub £24 A biography of Bryan Faussett, F.S.A., (1720-1776), pioneering Kent genealogist, archaeologist and antiquary who, at his death, had amassed the world's greatest collection of Anglo-Saxon jewellery and antiquities. The material was famously rejected by the British Museum, saved for the nation by a Liverpudlian philanthropist, and now resides in the Liverpool World Museum. This episode led directly to the British Museum's setting up departments devoted to British Antiquities.

This volume is the first to focus on Faussett, presenting comprehensive genealogical sections on the Faussetts and Godfreys; a history of the family seat near Canterbury; and an introduction to antiquarianism and how the history of the world was imperfectly viewed in the 18th century. A detailed biography of Bryan Faussett's life covers his education, career and scholarly circle, with detailed descriptions of the sites he excavated. Surviving archaeological notebooks offer insights into his working practice, and family account-books reveal a great deal about his personal life and interests.
