An important message from our Membership Secretary:

DATA PROTECTION: New General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) come into force on 25th May 2018. They apply to all organisations which hold personal data from the largest companies to small registered charities. Soon you will all be sent a consent form to be completed and returned to the CBA SE Membership Secretary either as a scanned copy by email or by post.

The new regulations require CBA SE to obtain explicit consent from each of our members to hold your personal data. The consent form may appear legalistic (apologies to any lawyers) but takes account of advice provided by outside bodies such as the Information Commissioner and the Charity Commission.

The personal data that CBA SE holds consists of each member's contact details which we need to keep you informed about all the activities (newsletters, e-letters, AGM and conference plus trips). I had hoped that many of you would be covered by CBA itself but have been advised that I need all member's consent.

Although we now have to comply with new rules the manner in which we handle your data has not changed. It will continue to be held by the Membership Secretary and made available to other committee members as necessary to enable mailings of our publications and notices by post or other electronic means.

We will not share your personal data with any other organisation or individual, nor will we sell it.

The project has a headquarters building with fully equipped kitchen, hot showers and flushing toilets.

A two week (Monday to Friday) undergraduate training course is available at a cost of £500. It will run from Monday 11th June to Friday 22nd June and the fee includes the cost of the camping site and use of the facilities. Food is not supplied. . The course is designed for those with little/no proactical experience of fieldwork and will cover excavation, geophysics, written and drawn recording, site surveying, photography, finds processing, standing building recording and environmental sampling. Monday 2nd July – Friday 17th August 2018 Sussex School of Archaeology – **Plumpton Roman Villa: volunteering and training**

Research and training excavations will resume at Plumpton Roman Villa. Training will include 5 day Excavation Technique courses. Each course will provide both 'hands-on' and theory introductions to archaeological excavation., including basic surveying and geophysics, excavation methods, written records, planning and section drawing, photography, environmental archaeology, finds processing and Health and Safety. These courses are suitable for beginners, those with limited experience, A level Classics students, people thinking of studying archaeology at university, and undergraduates. Tuition fees: £200 per 5 day course. The project will also include several 1 day Saturday 'Taster' excavation days: fees £40 per day. Volunteering opportunities (ie for those with some prior experience, such as participation in one of the training courses) are available for £25 for a 5 day week. Saturday 5th May 2018 (9.30 – 17.00) Shining a light on the 5th century AD in Surrey and the South-East: how did Roman Britain become Saxon England

A Surrey Archaeological Society conferenceThe South-East corner of England ought to be a key area in the understanding of this period. It has long been recognised that a simple 'invasion and replacement' demographic model should not be imposed in this, or any other region of England. Here (again, as elsewhere) there are clear examples of important elements of the Late Roman infrastructure of sites and roads emerging as components of the Early Anglo-Saxon settlement pattern. But we still have very little archaeological evidence for the period, in particular from c. AD 410-470.

The aim of the conference is to bring together a number of scholars with relevant expertise from each side of this gap and challenge them to say what they think was happening. Were many of the 'Saxons' here before the end of the Roman period? Is there a case for much more assimilation and continuity than is suggested in the traditional histories of the period? Can we arrive at a new model for the transition from Roman to Saxon in the South-East that takes account of current understanding of the later Roman and early Saxon periods, and establish a programme of work by which the model could be tested?
